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President's Report

Looking back at Recorder Society records, I find that I was first on the committee in about 1964 and have been involved in various ways in the years since then. After Jessica, with her professional expertise, had been President for quite a few years, I was happy to relieve her of that particular responsibility when her new teaching role took up too much of her time, though, of course, she is still happy to retain her tutor's cap.

I realize that our Society does not actually organize many events for members as a whole, partly because members are widely spread throughout the country. The nature of recorder playing means that it is more suitable for people playing in small groups. For this purpose the Society's library is our main asset, with a huge range of music available for borrowing. One of the committee's accomplishments this year has been some re-ordering of the library, with hopefully now a quicker response to borrowers' requests. There have also been some new acquisitions.

The main combined activity in 2011 was a tutored playing day in July, most efficiently organized by Dawn Manley along with Secretary Andrew Stewart and willing volunteer hosts from St John the Baptist Church, Northcote. This proved to be an excellent venue for such an activity, being only about five minutes from central Auckland, but with ample parking and very good facilities. We are also using it for the AGM and the associated playing afternoon.

I feel that it would be good if we could record in the Annual Report some of the recorder playing which goes on regularly around the country. For my part I hear something about the Mount Eden group and the Rangitoto College group, but otherwise only the librarians have some inkling of what playing may be happening. I would suggest that in future each group might send us a short summary in October of what it has been doing during the year. In fact, why not do it now, to provide some material for the next newsletter?

May I conclude by wishing everyone another very fulfilling year of recorder playing.

Strathean 2011

The great annual Strathean event arrived and Barb (honorary treasurer) and I motored down to Te Horo, a lovely semi-rural area north of Wellington, on the Friday night. Arrived 8-30ish to the sound of recorders wafting through the gaps in the 100 year old weatherboards. Katrin Eickhorst-Squire, the principal weekend tutor, already had the blokflutes in full voice.

Hugs all round to old recorder friends.

And – what's this. Anita and Els from Auckland are there. Great to put a name to a face.

Joined in and wiled away the evening playing a variety of music. Great end to the day.

Up early, breakfast and off for the customary morning walk with Barb and Els.

Then the sessions begin.

Kamala had arrived as the second tutor and away we went in two groups.

I can't remember it all, but I do remember variations of Millie Regretz (no relation to Miss Otis Regrets) that were beautiful.

Lunch and more playing. Ah, the joy of being in a balloon of isolation where all you have to think about is food and music.

A really interesting session on performance nerves. It morphed into a tell-all session from all attendees, and it took on a tone of a Recorderholics Anonymous meeting.

Bruce - "Hello, my name is Bruce, and I am a recorderholic".

Tutti - "Hello Bruce".

Bruce – " A few weeks ago I was in the middle of a performance and suddenly my knees started shaking and fell off, and I played an f natural instead of an f sharp during a molto prestissimo passage and I just know everyone heard it and I was sooooo embarrassed and it made me soooo nervous for the rest of the piece."

And so it went on, but it was very enlightening. It turns out even the best performers suffer from nerves. Sweaty hands, trembling knees, pounding heart, breath restriction, blank mind, eyes that glaze over and fail to see all those little pencil clues that you have dotted all over your score – everyone gets them and all are self-inflicted. Ways of overcoming them were discussed and explored and it is all an attitude thing. Develop your own method of overcoming them. Focus on other things that you do well. Know that you are the only one who can play the piece at that time – so the audience is at a disadvantage. The audience doesn't notice your mistakes. Enjoy playing the music – if you are not enjoying it then why are you doing it? Smile through any mistakes.

But there are two things to bear in mind – and these are the most important:

- 1. You will make mistakes. Accept it. They will happen in different places at different times. Now, having this knowledge, the issue is not what you do if you make a mistake, but what you do when you make a mistake.
- 2. Know your music 100%. 99% is not good enough. That way when you make your mistake you know the music so well that you will pick it up a note or two later.

I performed a piece for an up-coming performance and proved that the last point is indeed the key. Heart beating hard I managed to work through the few missed notes because I knew the music so well.

Pot-luck tea time (more food than you can ever imagine) and playing of Susato into the late hours by a hardy quartet of Barb, John, Anita and me. The sane ones had gone to bed.

Sunday (food & walk again – why does the Strathean weekend invariably occur during fine weather?).

A morning of Gabrielli. Twelve parts, in three choirs. The rich tapestry-landscape of a thousand chords while two sopranos soar overhead in a summer skylark duet. This is heaven. Then another one in two choirs of 5. What a morning! Emotionally exhausting.

Afternoon we had a session of Bach . I find that Bach can be a bit boring at times (too much maths and not enough music) but after a few runs through this was starting to become enjoyable.

As always seems to happen at Strathean it was over far too soon.

Farewell to my Strathean friends. A thousand thanks to the two Rons of REMU- (there is a song there somewhere – the two ron rons the two ron rons).
